Three children in Radcliffe died at about this time, and Helen was moved to propose to her church stewards that TCF should be the church's charity for the year. As you can imagine, Pat was delighted at the thought of a few hundred pounds for TCF!

There followed a year of events including coffee mornings, concerts, advent fairs and a wonderful auction. A young mother, Michelle Mills, sent letters all over the country asking for items for auction. Responses

included a hamper from Harrods donated by Mr. Al Fayad, four rounds of a golf at a local club, a tour of Nottingham Council House and tea with the Lord Mayor and Sheriff, Center Parcs day passes, trousers worn by Candice Stone from Coronation Street (!), a pen from Tony Blair and many vouchers for use in local restaurants and hairdressers.

On Sunday 12 February Pat and Jerry attended the morning service in Radcliffe and were presented with a cheque for £3,808.35. As you can imagine, they were quite overjoyed at this result!

This wonderful sum of money for TCF came as a result of a talk to a small group of people. If any readers are asked to give a talk, please say 'Yes': you never know what might arise from it!

At the beginning of 2005, having seen an appeal for desperately needed funds, and as TCF is a charity close to our own hearts we decided to find a way in which we could help.

As well as helping TCF continue, we wanted to do something in memory of our own angels Carrie and Emma. Having seen stamps for sale on the internet, and being aware that Derek had an established collection area in the south, we decided to do some research into whether it would be feasible to start collecting in our area, without affecting what Derek was doing.

After much careful planning we started to approach companies and little by little we built our circle of collectors. In total we have distributed about 8/900 letters seeking stamp donations and we now have a regular base of around 90 collectors. Some are very small amounts some are substantial. Our collectors are from many sections of the business community and include the chairman's office of probably the world's most famous department store. Those who we contacted who are not collecting are now at least aware that TCF exists and what it does.

Such was the response that we produce a collector's newsletter to keep our supporters informed. The newsletter is popular and after each issue there is a surge of stamps. We even have a sponsor who is kindly supporting two issues with a sizeable donation. Our best month's sales were in December when we raised just under £500.00, and the total for our first year was £3,103.55. Sales in our

second year are already ahead of our first, even though we are only 2 months in. We have been humbled at people's generosity

and willingness to help. As well as the stamps, we are finding people offering us all kinds of things to sell from jewellery and an antique tea pot to a miniature army of vintage lead soldiers! All of which was much appreciated and sold on ebay. These, along with donations

from local companies have raised in the region of £1000.00 on top of the stamp sales. In an effort to keep the money coming in we are exploring new avenues. We currently have TCF car stickers for sale. Our latest line has just been delivered. (photo attached) These are gold plate and enamel butterfly bookmarks, which we will be selling at £2.00 each or 3 for £5.00 inc postage. (available from Ken). All profits of course to TCF.

A few years ago Ruby Henderson and Gilly Thomson decided it would be good to produce a Scottish TCF Quilt that was similar to the butterfly quilts produced in England. However, they wanted a different theme. Gilly was inspired by the Eskimo legend of the stars, which reads:

Where the love of our lost ones

And shines down upon us
to let us know they are happy.*

It took a little time to find the right blue material with stars on it. Ruby and Gilly made up the packs for folks to make their own star. They were both touched by how different each square became.

As Gilly says, ‘Just as our children are unique.’ In October 2005 the quilt was entered into the Annual Autumn Quilt Show at Ingliston near Edinburgh, organised by the Fabrications Patchwork Magazine and won first prize in the category of Group Work.

*Raw deal or fair treatment?’ - Thursday 29 June 2006

Places are still available for the Conference at the Inns of Court School of Law. The aims of the conference will be: to improve practitioners' awareness of what can be done to ensure victims and witnesses get fair treatment, to promote best practice in inter professional responses to sudden and violent death, and to answer the question: ‘Is a victim centred approach compatible with the legal process?’

Speakers: Ken McDonald QC (DPP), Lawrence Gant (A & E Consultant), Jack Goble (Fire Investigator, London Fire Brigade, and Magistrate), ACC John Broughton (ACPO), Diana Youdale (Compassionate Friends), Joyce Plotnikoff (Consultant to the Home Office and Office for Criminal Justice Reform on vulnerable witnesses). They will talk about the practices and procedures in place in their organisation to support victims and witnesses.

The afternoon programme will consist of workshops based on case studies, illustrating good and bad practice, to explore.

Delegates are invited from the Police, Social Services, fire and ambulance services, healthcare practitioners, lawyers, voluntary sector, and emergency planning Departments.

Conference fee will be £90 per person, with a £10 reduction per person for 2 or more booked in a single booking.

This is a must attend, low-cost professional development event for organisations dealing with sudden, violent death.
